I. RECOMMENDATION:

II. BACKGROUND:

On May 7, 2020, the City Council passed and adopted Resolution No. 3964 Declaring all Businesses in the City as Essential Businesses. The Resolution was passed and adopted by the following vote:

A copy of the Resolution is attached.

III. DISCUSSION:

On July 22, 2020, City Manager, Marissa Trejo, received a call from Cal OES Legislative and External Affairs Director Reggie Salvador, Cal OES Lead Attorney Alex Pal, and League of California Cities Deputy Executive Director of Advocacy and Public Affairs.

Mr. Salvador and Mr. Pal explained to Mrs. Trejo that Cal OES would be withholding the City of Coalinga's CARES Act funding due to the City of Coalinga adopting a Resolution declaring all businesses as essential. They stated in order for the City to receive the funding, Council would need to rescind the Resolution.

The City of Coalinga's CARES Act allocation is \$212,358. Documentation attached.

Also, attached is a letter that was sent to Governor Newsom from members of Congress regarding disbursement of funds to local government agencies.

IV. ALTERNATIVES:

1. The Council may rescind the Resolution to receive CARES Act funding;

- 2. The Council may choose not to rescind the Resolution and not receive CARES Act funding;
- 3. The City Attorney will provide legal alternatives during the discussion on this item.

RESOLUTION NO. 3964

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COALINGA DECLARING ALL BUSINESSES IN THE CITY AS ESSENTIAL BUSINESSES

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Coalinga proclaimed a local emergency in its adoption of Resolution No. 3959 in response to the spread of the novel coronavirus ("COVID-19");

WHEREAS, the California Governor has enacted Executive Order Number N-33-20 designating certain business sectors as essential and requesting those employed at essential businesses to abide by social distancing guidelines;

WHEREAS, in response to Executive Order Number N-33-20, a large number of local businesses were deemed non-essential and forced to close to prevent the spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, cities in California have the authority to designate their own essential businesses in order to maintain public health and safety and to support businesses;

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Coalinga has deemed it necessary to declare and categorize all businesses within the City as "essential business" for the purpose of allowing all businesses to remain open during the COVID-19 pandemic;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the City Council of the City of Coalinga that:

- 1. All businesses within the City of Coalinga limits are declared and categorized as "essential businesses" and are permitted to remain open for the duration of the local and state emergency.
- All businesses which chose to remain open during the COVID-19 pandemic shall adhere to the social distancing guidelines as provided by the Center for Disease Control including, but not limited to the following:
 - a. stay at least 6 feet (about 2 arms' length) from other people;
 - b. Do not gather in groups; and
 - c. Stay out of crowded places and avoid mass gatherings.
- 3. All businesses which chose to remain open during the COVID-19 pandemic are strongly encouraged to follow the suggestions below from the Center for Disease Control:
 - a. Encourage employees and patrons to wash their hands thoroughly for at least 20 seconds after being in a public space;
 - b. Encourage employees and patrons to use hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol;
 - c. Encourage employees and patrons to avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth while in a public space;

- d. Encourage employees and patrons to cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover, such as a mask or bandana;
- e. Encourage employees and patrons to cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue or elbow and immediately wash your hands for at least 20 seconds afterwards;
- f. Develop and implement a plan for cleaning and disinfecting surfaces which the public will come in contact with including a normal routine cleaning with soap and water on surfaces and objects and disinfect using EPA-approved disinfectants.

Governor Newsom:

We are writing today in response to reports from our local health officials that your office has given notice to several counties that Federal funding from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act would be withheld if they do not fully comply with mandates created by the State. All of us, as Members of the California Congressional Delegation, share your concern with the rising number of active COVID-19 cases in California. Choosing this moment to threaten local government funding is unhelpful and counterproductive.

Congress intended for the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) authorized and appropriated in the CARES Act to serve as an immediate \$150 billion line of aid to every State and local government in the nation. California received, by far, the largest allocation in the country: \$15.3 billion, of which \$9.5 billion was disbursed directly to the State. California's 2020 Budget tepidly directs \$1.8 billion in Federal funding to cities and counties, including those that already received direct payments from the U.S. Treasury. This funding is needed to help counties and cities train contact tracers, expand local healthcare capacity, and provision any other assistance needed. Yet as of July 1st, California has delivered almost none of this Federal aid to local governments and counties.

By withholding CRF payment disbursements from these localities, the State is creating winners and losers. In addition, guidance issued by the U.S. Department of the Treasury regarding implementation of the CRF clearly says that States cannot impose restrictions on transfers of funds to local governments that go beyond requirements outlined in Section 601(d) of the Social Security Act. Accordingly, we believe that the State may be inappropriately withholding CRF funds to localities by imposing conditions on such disbursements that are inconsistent with the Treasury Department's guidance and Section 601(d) of the Social Security Act.

As COVID-19 positive cases in California increase once again, our local governments are left with fewer options and less funding than they had earlier this year. Rather than continue to withhold Federal funding in exchange for compliance with State mandates, and to ensure that the State is in full compliance with the Treasury Department's guidance and the law, we ask that you expeditiously release this funding to our local officials.

Dear Ms. Trejo:

On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom proclaimed a State of Emergency to exist statewide due to the threat of COVID-19. Since that time, COVID-19 has spread throughout California, requiring further action to protect the public health and safety. On March 19, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-33-20, which incorporated the State Public Health Officer's Stay-at-Home Order. This Order continues to apply statewide and remains necessary for the preservation of public health and safety. On May 4, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order N-60-20. The Order allows local jurisdictions to take measured and meaningful steps to modify public health directives where public health data supports such a decision.

All of these actions were, and remain, necessary to preserve public health and safety. Fresno County is no exception, as it has been on the county monitoring list for 45 days with elevated disease transmission within the community and a test positivity rate of 11.3%. Additionally, hospitalizations in the county continue to increase. COVID-19 does not stop at administrative boundaries and one community's failure to follow public health orders will negatively impact other communities.

The State of California is providing and distributing financial support to assist local governments in responding to the impacts of the unprecedented COVID-19 pandemic. This funding is conditioned on the jurisdiction's adherence to federal guidance and the state's stay-at-home requirements and other health requirements as directed in gubernatorial Executive Order N-33-20, subsequent executive orders or statutes, and all State Department of Public Health orders, directives, and guidance issued in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.¹ Local governments must certify compliance to the Department of Finance when they apply for this funding. In the certification, the jurisdiction must affirm it has not enacted any ordinances or resolutions that are inconsistent with the state's stay-at-home order. This is necessary to ensure that all jurisdictions are adhering to public health directives and ensure for the protection of public health and safety.

As you are aware, on May 7, 2020, the City of Coalinga passed Resolution number 3964, declaring businesses in Coalinga to be essential businesses. This is inconsistent with the state's public health directives, threatens the public health and safety of the City of Coalinga's residents, and renders the City ineligible for up to \$212,358 in state assistance in accordance with the FY 20-21 State Budget Act.

I understand Coalinga Mayor, Ron Lander, issued a letter on May 26, 2020, to the Coalinga community explaining that the aforementioned Resolution was intended to serve as interim guidelines until Fresno County went through the formal attestation process with the California Department of Public Health. However, while the *county*'s attestation has been submitted and accepted, the Resolution the City Council remains in place.

It is our goal to ensure that every eligible jurisdiction in California, including the City of Coalinga, receives this funding. In order to be eligible for funding, assuming it meets the other prescribed criteria, the City would need to rescind this resolution. I ask that you please advise once the City has formally rescinded this Resolution and has moved forward to expeditiously implement and enforce state public health guidelines. Thank you for your anticipated cooperation.
