2. AWARDS, PRESENTATIONS, APPOINTMENTS AND PROCLAMATIONS

1. Proclamation - Aera Energy LLC., 100 Year Anniversary.

Mayor Lander read the Proclamation for AERA ENERGY LLC - 100 Year Anniversary August 5, 2013.

In 1913 B.H. Van der Linden, a representative of the Royal Dutch/Shell Group of Companies, was searching for oil producing properties on the West Coast and found a field being sold by California Oilfields Ltd. in Coalinga. They purchased the Coalinga oilfields for \$13M. It represented Shell's first foothold in the oil production business in North America. Since that purchase, the Coalinga oilfield has produced more than 290M barrels of oil. In 1997 Shell and Mobil merged their California exploration and production operations to form AERA Energy LLC a stand alone California company.

The Company is a long time member of the Coalinga Chamber of Commerce and serves as a sponsor of the Annual Horned Toad Derby Celebration. In addition, AERA is the principal sponsor of the Coalinga-Huron Library District's Summer Reading Program. Annually, AERA offers two college scholarships to graduating Coalinga High School seniors and participates in the annual West Hills College's foundation benefit golf tournament.

2. Length of Service Award - Fire Dept Volunteers

Fire Chief Steve Henry honored Joey Ramsey and Ron Ramsey with outstanding length of service awards. Countless hours of dedication to the Fire Department and this community was given by both these men.

Joey Ramsey became Volunteer of the Year in 1989 by responding to the highest number of requests for assistance. He continued to give outstanding volunteer service from 2003 through 2009. Joey was presented a Twenty-five Year Service Award.

In 1976 Council Member Ramsey joined the Fire Department. Ron was voted Volunteer of the Year in 1978 and in 1990. He demonstrated dedicated commitment to this Department and the community. A plaque was presented to Council Member Ramsey honoring his 37 years of dedicated service from 1976 to 2013.

Mayor Lander extended his appreciation for their continued service to this community. Council Member Ramsey has served this community as mayor and has served in many other capacities. Joey Ramsey continues to serve the City as an employee.

6. ORDINANCE PRESENTATION, DISCUSSION AND POTENTIAL ACTION ITEMS

1. Introduce and Waive First Reading of Ordinance No. 774 (Nonconforming uses and structures)
Sean Brewer, Assistant Community Development Director

Assistant Community Development Director Sean Brewer:

The City of Coalinga is in the process of drafting a new zoning code and one of the major changes is the language related to nonconforming uses and structures and how they are regulated. The adoption of this section will have an immediate impact on the citizens of Coalinga. It will allow for the continued use of existing nonconforming uses and structures contrary to the current code that is outdated and utilized an amortization period for the complete elimination of uses and structures that do not conform to the zoning code. Staff is requesting the Council to consider approving Ordinance No. 774 and replace the existing nonconforming use section with the new language which was recommended by the Planning Commission at their June 11, 2013 regular scheduled meeting.

Ordinance No. 774 regulates the uses in a manner that does not impair public health, safety and general welfare while allowing them to remain. This would allow someone who owns a home to restore the home should it be damaged by fire or other calamity. The current code would preclude such restoration from occurring.

2. Discussion of Housing Element Approach for Planning Period 2015-2023
Sean Brewer, Assistant Community Development Director

*Assistant Community Development Director **Sean Brewer**:*

The Fresno Council of Governments has been assigned the responsibility to act as liaison between the 15 cities and Fresno County and the State Department of Housing and Community Development to administer the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) Program.

Once the State determines the number of housing units required within the County for all levels of affordability, it is up to the cities and the county to adopt and implement a methodology for distributing that responsibility among the jurisdictions. The housing element document is that policy document that ensures the ability to accommodate that assigned number of units within each given jurisdiction through zone changes, policies, programs and incentives.

Staff is seeking direction from the Council to pursue the approach of a Countywide Housing Element for Planning Period 2015-2023.

Consensus of Council is to "go for it". (Garcia absent)

3. Discussion of Housing Successor Agency Bond Proceeds
Sean Brewer, Assistant Community Development Director

Assistant Community Development Director Sean Brewer:

In 2009 the Council passed an RDA Tax Allocation Bond. As part of that bond was approximately \$2.2M in housing proceeds to be used for low to moderate income qualifying housing activities or projects.

At the Council's last meeting a request was made from the Warthan Place Apartments Investors for a share of those funds in order to leverage phase one of their workforce housing multi-family project. At that

meeting the Council gave direction to staff to table the consideration until Council has had time to discuss other opportunities for the use of funds before making a determination in contributing to the Warthan Place Apartments project.

Staff is bringing this item to the Council for discussion and possible direction for the use of some or all of these remaining funds that have been allocated for low to moderate income housing. The following are projects which have been discussed by Council in past meetings as well as requests by others:

1. West Hills College Build-a-House Program
2. Warthan Place Apartments Request
3. Housing Rehabilitation and Down Payment Assistance Program

Council Member Keough is on record as being against the Warthan Place Apartments request.

Mayor Pro-tem Oxborrow asked about funds he is requesting from the City. He thinks the development would improve that part of town. He thinks it would benefit moderate income families. What is minimum to make him competitive? He has problem with 36 months. Rehabilitation Program and down payment assistance he likes very much. Would \$1M plus impact fees help? There are so many variables to consider.

John Cicerone, C.F.Y. Development, Inc. said he is asking for deferred impact fees and bond funds. He needs as much as possible. If you gave him \$1.7M plus deferred impact fees, it would permit him to apply for tax credits next year and he would be pulling building permits in 2014.

City Attorney Avedisen indicated that bond program does not go away in 2016; oversight boards go away. Bond proceeds should not expire.

Mr. Brewer said in 2016 the successor agencies were to be merged. It is the oversight board being consolidated. Housing Bond proceeds are still in the hands of the City.

Mayor Pro-tem Oxborrow said there are two separate apartment units. We are going to be out of the bond monies for the Phase 2.

Mayor Lander said bottom line is whether to proceed with this or not. The question is do you want to proceed with this and how much do you want to participate.

Keough - NO

Ramsey - Wants tabled.

Consensus of the Council is to **table** this item. (Garcia Absent)

4. Recommendation to Purchase 197 Acre-Feet of Water from the San Luis Delta Mendota Water Authority for \$52,300.00.

Rene A. Ramirez, City Manager

City Manager Ramirez is recommending that the City Council authorize the City Manager to purchase 197 acre-feet (AF) of additional water supply from the San Luis Delta Mendota Water Authority (SLDMWA) for water year 2014 (WY14) at a unit cost of \$265.47 per AF or a total of \$52,297.59.

There has been a couple of water districts that have 36,000 acre-feet at \$112.14 per AF.

Water costing \$265.47 per Af or a total of \$52, 297.59 is more expensive than through the Bureau. The three cities have been told by the Bureau that they are still looking for water for the communities.

Fresno City water has pulled together 2000 AF. If we take 500 acre feet from Fresno they want 1000 acre-ft back.

Mayor Pro-tem Oxborrow wants reports on water consumption, etc. like we used to receive. There are lots of issues. We need to be diligent and know to whom we are selling water. We need to monitor more.

5. Police Department - Monthly Report

Cal Minor

Chief Minor gave his report on staffing.

Very successful Derby -- no major problems.

Several incidents outside of Derby ended up costing \$15K in overtime.

Burgularies - reduced throughout the year:

Residentials down 29%

Commerical-up

Vehicles down 29% for year.

Officers limiting overtime.

Case highlights May 23 - narcotics - \$500 seized - search warrant for narcotics. Third search warrant served in 600 block of West Elm - suspect arrested.

Shooting on May 25th - Have less than cooperative witnesses - Identified suspect vehicle. In process of identifying shooter.

Next morning there was altercation - identified all suspects involved and arrested all four suspects. Tremendous amount of work. Individual recieved serious stab wounds.

Stabbing in January - suspect identified and arrested and prosecuted - he is scheduled for July 19 for twelve years. This is person we had interest in about our arson fires. Since his arrest in February - arson fires are down.

Long indepth investigation of substitute teacher - working through the judicial system.

Yesterday patrol spotted burglary in progress. Suspect fled before officers arrived. Suspect picked up within three hours.

Takes cooperation of home owner calling right away. Call police first.

Council Member Ramsey - on Facebook - are bicycles still licensed through police department.

Chief said program still active.

6. Fire Department - Monthly Report

Steve Henry

Chief Henry gave report of Battle of the Badges and blood drive. Megan Newton and Ally Witt joined forces to get the word out about the drive. Coalinga Fire Fighters Assoc. barbecued a meal. It was easy to give blood and then have dinner. We collected 120% of our population. We had people from outside our community come and donate blood. We all go to the Central California Blood Bank for our emergency blood needs. Things like this have a big impact not only in the metropolitan area but in the rural area.

Tulare River Fire Department hired one of our reserve fire fighters Dan Wilson. Because of what he has learned here in Coalinga he has asked to stay on the roll because, in time, he would like to come back and volunteer as a reserve for us. He would be working for Tulare and volunteering for us.

Engine. - still pending. The application is being weighted and they seem to think we should be in line for an engine. The assistant chief out of Sacramento shared it could be up to 120 days before we see any of that equipment moving. They are shy at moving this equipment during the peak of the fire season.

The Fire Prevention Bureau has been reborn and the program will be run by Captain Duane Gabriel and Engineer Paul Odoul. They are being trained by brothers from other agencies. While that is going on, our folks will train our shifts and our engine companies will go out and conduct fire prevention. It gives an opportunity for our fire fighters to get inside our businesses to look around so they don't have to figure out what is there in the middle of the night during a fire. Our second newsletter will be going out to our businesses. The firefighters write and build the newsletter and the Firefighters' Association prints it. We are explaining the new fire inspection regulations.

We have been involved in wild land training. We participated in the operational area that was provided for us. It is a one day event with the training here in the Valley. We send them out during the day and bring them back at night so there is no hotel billings.

Patrol 272 was part of a task force with Fresno County, Clovis Fire and Reedley Fire. They were assigned to the Revis incident in Tulare County. Our resources went up there twice out of the twenty two fires they had. We were also involved in the Carson incident in Mariposa the first night. They took pictures to show you what they experienced and they were at the head of the fire. In June there was a fire on the east side of the county and every department in the County was involved in one way or other. We were covering Huron while we were staffed in town. .

For July 4th we had 3 fire calls outside of the City between here and Huron. In the City we had a dumpster and a tree fire. As Chief Minor mentioned our arson rates have dropped drastically in the last few months.

755 total calls - during the past three months - 82% were EMS calls - 3% were fire with \$126K loss - 1% service calls, 2% hazardous conditions, 9% good intent and 2% false alarm calls.

Five members of our confined space recurring training went to rescue training in Selma. We have an agreement with Fresno County Fire District for aid. They conducted training in Selma and for \$25 instead of the \$375 it would have cost to get that training somewhere else, we were able to train five members and

saved a substantial amount (\$6300) from the General Fund.

The Coalinga Firefighters Association is partnering with the International Firefighters for them to come and provide some training for us. We have applied for confined space awareness training and first responder operational training (this is a mandate and we are out of compliance). These classes are being funded totally by the firefighters union at the International level. They are providing instructors, etc. This will save thousands of dollars in training. This will take place the second week of August and it is higher level training. We have issues out at the water plant and we have abandoned oil containers and other types of buildings which could collapse. They will provide us another class in October from the same grant and raise our level of experience. Lemoore Naval Air Station will be providing training in August and it will allow our folks to get crash rescue training. This offers another aspect to our airport.

Training hours were 385 for April, 387 in May and 174 in June.

Mayor Pro-tem Oxborrow asked if there could be some tumble weed training. What can we do to have a successful year this year? The Tamerack trees in the creek bed need clearing. There is debris in the creek bed and debris around within the City.

7. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Council Member Keough said he has visited with department heads and other staff members who have talked with him just to get better acquainted.

Mayor Lander met with COG to talk about Sustainable Communities which includes walking and bicycle paths, air pollution and dust control efforts, etc. He asked that they spend time with City Manager Ramirez and with Mr. Brewer. He let them know we have a very professional staff in Coalinga. They were very impressed with our community.

The hospital bill to be voted on in September. We need to hope for the best.

Channel 47 asked - what do people do when it gets hot? We stay inside.

City Manager Ramirez announced that Thursday the 18th is the next budget meeting at 6:00. The Council agreed to this date.

Mayor Pro-tem Oxborrow would like to see us, at that meeting, have several budget scenarios for Council to consider and how staff has created the budgets.

City Manager Ramirez said they plan to have several scenarios with a recommendation from the City Manager and then discussion with the Council.

Also, we have a meeting on August 1st and he is recommending we meet on August 15 to deal with the bid awards for the Downtown Plaza. There will be two meetings in August. The August 15 meeting should be only one item.

Assistant Community Development Director Brewer indicated there may be one additional item which would be the approval of the archway sign.

On July 3 Congressman Valadeo came to town. Chamber executive Kathy Delano asked that he and Mr. Keough meet with him. There were several additional people from the community in the meeting. We told him about the need for improved water resources.

The prior week he was in Fresno with Mr. Perea. Claremont (CCC) was brought to his attention. The federal government is telling our State they have to release 10,000 inmates. We are not hearing anything from Sacramento about this event though there are empty CCFs in the Valley. Mr. Perea said he was going to work with Assemblyman Salas of the Bakersfield area. He is working on this in behalf of the Kern County facilities. Hopefully, something might come of that. The Police Chief and HR Director and he meet with the folks at the Corcoran State Prison about a substance abuse program and about how the program works, etc. They were very helpful.

Right now our focus is the budget.

The Fresno County Film Commissioner's office is pushing a commercial for the RAM Trucks. They want to do a film on farming/agriculture. He made several contacts and Harris Farms stepped up to say they would love to accommodate them. These past two days a film company with about 50 people were out at the Harris Farms' area filming a commercial for the Dodge Ram truck. The commercial should come out within a couple of months perhaps during the football season.

Today he received notification from our construction manager for the Palmer Tank and the Notice to Proceed was filed and the contractor has 280 calendar days to construct the new Palmer tank.

8. FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

Council Member Keough wants the Sports Complex placed on the agenda. There are lots of people waiting to see what is going to be done. He wants to know where we are and where we are going? Who owns it and who controls it and what would it take to get it up and going? There seems to be confusion between the park district and the City. He talked to Mr. Honburger and he was unsure. The City pays the utility bills on it, but he is unsure as to who owns it.

Mr. Garcia brought it up in February and he does not recall anything coming back about it.

AERA ENERGY LLC 100 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

WHEREAS, in 1913 B.H. Van der Linden, a representative of the Royal Dutch/Shell Group of Companies, was searching for oil producing properties on the West Coast and found a field being sold by California Oilfields Ltd. in Coalinga, California. Van der Linden evaluated the field and ultimately, Royal Dutch/Shell Group of Companies purchased California Oilfields Ltd. and its Coalinga oilfields in 1913 for \$13 million. This purchase represented Shell's first foothold in the oil production business in North America, and;

WHEREAS, the property Shell purchased was known as "Oilfields" and was a virtually self-sufficient oil producing village. It had comfortable living quarters for the oilfield workers and their families as well as its own tool, tank and tin shops; farm; and water plant. Drillers enjoyed the best housing, food and wages. Since the purchase 100 years ago, the Coalinga oilfield has produced more than 290 million barrels of oil, and;

WHEREAS, in 1997 Shell and Mobil merged their California exploration and production operations to form Aera Energy LLC, a stand alone California company. Today the Coalinga field operated by Aera averages 7,000 barrels of heavy crude oil per day from approximately 690 producing wells and 100 steam injection wells, and;

WHEREAS, Aera and its employees in Coalinga carry on a tradition of community involvement and support through sponsorship of various groups and local educational programs. The company is a long time member of the Coalinga Chamber of Commerce and serves as a sponsor of the annual Horned Toad Derby celebration. In addition, Aera is the principal sponsor of the Coalinga-Huron Library District's Summer Reading Program. Annually Aera offers two college scholarships to graduating Coalinga High School seniors and participates in the annual West Hills College Foundation benefit golf tournament.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Ron Lander, Mayor of the City of Coalinga, do hereby proclaim that August 5, 2013 as the 100 Year Anniversary for Aera Energy LLC.

SAMPLE RESOLUTION

RESOLUTION NO. 3609

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE INCLUSION OF A MEASURE ON THE JUNE 3, 2014 FRESNO COUNTY PRIMARY BALLOT TO EXTEND THE AVA PROGRAM FOR A TEN-YEAR PERIOD

WHEREAS, the Fresno County Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) Service Authority was formed in 2004; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the AVA program is to partially reimburse cities and the county for expenses incurred in the abatement of abandoned vehicles within their jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, funding for the program comes from a \$1 AVA fee on all vehicles for vehicle registration renewals and original applications; and

WHEREAS, the AVA program was approved for a ten-year period that is scheduled to sunset on June 30, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Policy Board of the Fresno Council of Governments serves as the Fresno County AVA Service Authority; and

WHEREAS, on May 30, 2013, the Fresno County AVA Service Authority unanimously directed COG staff to proceed with a ten-year extension of Fresno County's AVA program; and

WHEREAS, approval by two-thirds of the voting electorate is required in order to extend the AVA program; and

WHEREAS, approval of a majority of the cities having a majority of the incorporated population within the county and a two-thirds vote of the Board of Supervisors is required in order to place the issue on the ballot; and

WHEREAS, the next available countywide ballot opportunity is the June 3, 2014 primary election; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable to the *name of jurisdiction* to have the AVA program continue.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that *the name of jurisdiction* approves the inclusion of a measure on the June 3, 2014 Fresno County primary ballot to extend the AVA program for a ten-year period.

The foregoing resolution was introduced at a regular meeting of the City of Coalinga on the 11 day of July, 2013. A motion was made and seconded to adopt the foregoing Resolution. Motion carried and the Resolution was adopted.

I. RECOMMENDATION:

The Police Department requests the Council support Resolution No. 3609 regarding the extension of the Fresno County Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) program, and the continued collection of the \$1 vehicle registration fee which funds the program and requires approval by Fresno County voters.

II. BACKGROUND:

Extension of the Fresno County Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) program, and the continued collection of the \$1 vehicle registration fee which funds the program, requires approval by Fresno County voters. In order to place this matter before the voters on the June 3, 2014 primary ballot, approval is required by a majority of the cities having a majority of the incorporated population within the county and a two-thirds vote of the Board of Supervisors. Enclosed Resolution No. 3609 approves the inclusion of a measure on the June 3, 2013 Fresno County primary ballot to extend the AVA program for a ten-year period.

III. DISCUSSION:

Fresno County's Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) program was established in 2004 by approval of a majority of the cities having a majority of the incorporated population within the county and a two-thirds vote of the Board of Supervisors. The AVA program was approved for a ten-year period that is scheduled to sunset on June 30, 2014. The Policy Board of the Fresno Council of Governments serves as the Fresno County AVA Service Authority.

In November 2010, years after the original establishment of Fresno County's AVA program, Proposition 26 was approved by the voters of California. Fresno COG legal counsel has advised that Proposition 26 applies to an extension of the AVA program and, therefore, approval by two-thirds of the voting electorate is now required in order to extend the AVA program for an additional ten year period. Approval by a majority of the cities having a majority of the incorporated population within the county and a two-thirds vote (effectively, four votes) of the Board of Supervisors is required in order to place the issue on the ballot.

On May 30, 2013, the Fresno COG Policy Board, acting in its capacity as the Fresno County Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) Service Authority, unanimously directed COG staff to proceed with a ten-year extension of Fresno County's AVA program. Earlier, the Policy Advisory Committee, at their meeting on May 10, 2013, recommended **with emphasis** that the AVA Service Authority direct staff to proceed with a ten-year extension.

The purpose of the Fresno County AVA program is to partially reimburse cities and the county for expenses incurred in the abatement of abandoned vehicles within their jurisdiction. Funding for the program comes from a \$1 AVA fee on all vehicles for vehicle registration renewals and original applications. Since program inception and through fiscal year 2011/12, the last complete fiscal year for which data is available (eight of the ten years), \$5,148,849.27 was reimbursed to local agencies and 31,437 vehicle abatements were claimed. The dollar amount received and the number of vehicles abated by each jurisdiction are listed in the Exhibit A

enclosure for this item. Fresno COG costs totaled \$77,944.00 to administer the program for the eight-year period.

The next available countywide ballot opportunity is the June 3, 2014 primary election. There is a cost to put this matter on the ballot, with direct costs estimated by the County Elections Department to range from \$45,000 to \$60,000. While applicable statutes indicate this fee cannot be paid from AVA revenues, the Fresno County AVA Service Authority (Fresno COG Policy Board) has authorized the use of Local Transportation Fund (LTF) revenues for this purpose. In addition, however, there are indirect costs associated with the June 2014 primary election ballot, estimated by County Elections Department to range from \$150,000 to \$220,000 for the AVA measure. Upon request, these indirect costs may be waived by the Board of Supervisors given that the election will proceed regardless of any AVA measure on the ballot. However, if the Board does not waive these indirect costs, a source of funding for them will need to be identified.

Other AVA programs in the San Joaquin Valley and throughout the state have been contacted by COG staff to determine how they have addressed the requirement of two-thirds voter approval for program extension. Seven of the eight counties within the San Joaquin Valley have AVA programs. Kern County is the exception. Kings, Madera, Merced, and San Joaquin counties do not have to address the issue of program extension until 2015 or later. Stanislaus and Tulare counties extended their programs in 2011 and 2012, respectively, by the same process by which the programs were originally established, without seeking approval of the electorate. However, several counties throughout the state, including Mendocino, Humboldt, Amador, Butte and Calaveras, took the matter to the electorate and in each case received more than the two-thirds approval vote required. Other counties, including Orange, San Diego and San Mateo, decided to terminate their program rather than seek an extension.

IV. ALTERNATIVES:

Council can decide not to support Resolution No. 3609 and the City would be excluded from the program.

or

Council can approve Resolution No. 3609 approving the inclusion of a measure on the June 3, 2014 Fresno County primary ballot to extend the AVA program for a ten-year period.

6.1 Budget Workshop Fiscal Year 2013/2014

City Manager Ramirez thanked the Council for meeting this evening to discuss the City's 2013/2014 Fiscal Year Budget. A special thank you goes to Mari Jimenez and Frank Esparza who have worked hard to develop this proposed budget along with department heads and managers. Mari has been doing double duty because she continually has to answer questions from the Department of Finance in reference to the Successor Agency.

Tonight we plan to discuss the General Fund Budget and the next meeting will consist of discussion of the Enterprise Funds and our Capital Improvement funding. If we were to complete the discussion on the General Fund this evening, at the next meeting we will discuss Enterprise Funds, Capital Improvement funding and recommend the proposed budget for adoption. If necessary, he will recommend a meeting be held prior to July 1 to adopt Resolution(s) so the City may continue to operate until a budget is adopted.

You are in receipt of the General Fund Proposed Budget for FY2013/14. Estimated Revenue is \$7,884,478 with Expenses of \$828,999 leaving a variance or deficiency of \$644,520. Ending fund balance FY2013 does not include personnel costs for two months (May/June) estimated at \$900,000. The estimated ending fund balance is \$349,000.

Our Plan is to continue or maintain the same service level to our residents. He would also like to introduce a 5-10 Year Capital Improvement Plan.

The City has monies for streets, Palmer Tank and wastewater plant. There is, also, \$3M in Reserves.

Another goal is to get the CCF back into operation.

Department heads and managers were given Detailed Budget Request forms which they did complete for additional personnel and/or special equipment, etc. These proposed budget expenditures are not included in the proposed budget presented to you and would take Council approval.

You have been given two additional attachments:

- Gas Tax Funds, Measure C Funds, TDA and Measure C Funds
- General Fund: Revenue vs. Expenses with and without Claremont CCF Open

A point of interest and/or concern is Item 4801 which is the estimated price for the sale of City Property (EDA buildings converted to condominiums). A future workshop is recommended to discuss the EDA buildings as condominiums and their sale.

As you know last year's budget reflected some items which did not come to fruition such as CCF taking in L.A. County inmates as well as a proposed \$1.9M from ambulance receipts. Our proposed revenue plan includes those items normally attributed to the General Fund in a conservative manner to include \$1.5M in ambulance sales.

Councilmember Garcia expressed concern regarding the sale of this City property. He does not feel the \$1.1M should be included in the budget because there is no guarantee of this happening.

City Treasurer Keough expressed like concern as well as other budgetary concerns. (She was seated where the City Clerk could not hear details of her conversation could not be heard. This was also true with Finance Manager Mari Jimenez.)

There was discussion in reference to the condominiums as to their number, square footage and pricing. There are renters in some of the buildings and they need to be advised regarding the plans of the City.

Council Member Keough joined Council Member Garcia with his voiced concerns regarding the possible sale of the condominiums. He and other Council Members feel the budget should reflect what is a known or given revenue not something speculated to happen.

There was discussion amongst the Council Members and staff regarding Claremont Custody and the indebtedness paid from the General Fund. At the last audit Mr. Jolley suggested the Council consider the transfer of monies from the General Capital Fund back into the General Fund to reimburse what the General Fund expended to the CCF. This would draw down all reserves.

City Manager Ramirez indicated the cost just to maintain CCF will probably run \$250K annually.

There is always the ability to borrow from the Enterprise Funds.

Council Members indicated that should not be an option.

There is the CalPERS unfunded liability of 3%.

Finance Director Jimenez comments but she could not be heard.

Treasurer Keough questioned why the increase in salaries for the HR Department.

City Manager Ramirez explained it involves a 5% merit increase in salary plus the medical insurance plan.

The Gas Tax Fund involves Randy Arp's department. He proposes to expend \$4500 for crack seal; \$10K for additional dig-out areas; \$5K on a security gate at the yard (it is wide open and should be protected); \$2500 for the exterior painting of building; \$2500 for the purchase of an air compressor; \$1250 for a locator and \$5K for a bob-cat broom attachment.

Assistant Community Development Director Sean Brewer discussed the Street projects and the use of the Transportation Development Act Funds, Measure C Funds, TDA and Measure "C" funding. He went into detail as to how the projects, funding and grants work to assist us in enhancing and maintenance of our City.

Mayor Lander said to take the \$1.1M listed as revenue from the budget and staff should rework the budget realistically.

Council Member Garcia wants the information regarding the budget to get out to everyone. Some staff members are unaware of the City's budget concerns.

General conversation:

There needs to be a conversation with our City auditor in reference to monies in the General Capital Fund. There was a lot of general discussion about the General Capital Fund and the indebtedness paid through the General Fund and that the City will have zero reserves but CCF will have no debt.

Mayor Lander said we need to work on the EDA building buyback resolutions. Staff has to get down to dry bones because there is no pie-in-the-sky of \$1.1M.

Council Member Garcia wants information on the ambulance fund.

Treasurer Keough indicated the City needs to prepare a Deficient Budget because in one year you have no General Fund reserves.

City Manager Ramirez indicated he is glad to have had these discussions. Staff will come back next week with a newly proposed budget.

After discussion, it was decided to meet again next Wednesday at 5:00 to continue the budget meeting.

Data Collection and System Construction

Quad Knopf will collect and refine the following GIS data for use in a GIS system for the City of Coalinga. The data will be formatted into GIS shapefiles (points, lines, and polygons) with corresponding attribute data.

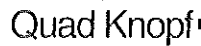

- Gas Distribution System lines, services, meters, valves (lines and points)
- School Sites (polygon)
- Park Sites (polygon)
- Other City-owned Sites (polygon)

Aerial Photography is also available, varying from on-line, free photography to more accurate photography that can be purchased from outside vendors. We will work with you to determine the option that best suits your needs. Additional pricing of aerial photography is not currently included.

Once the data is created and has been reviewed internally, Quad Knopf will meet with City staff to review the data for accuracy.

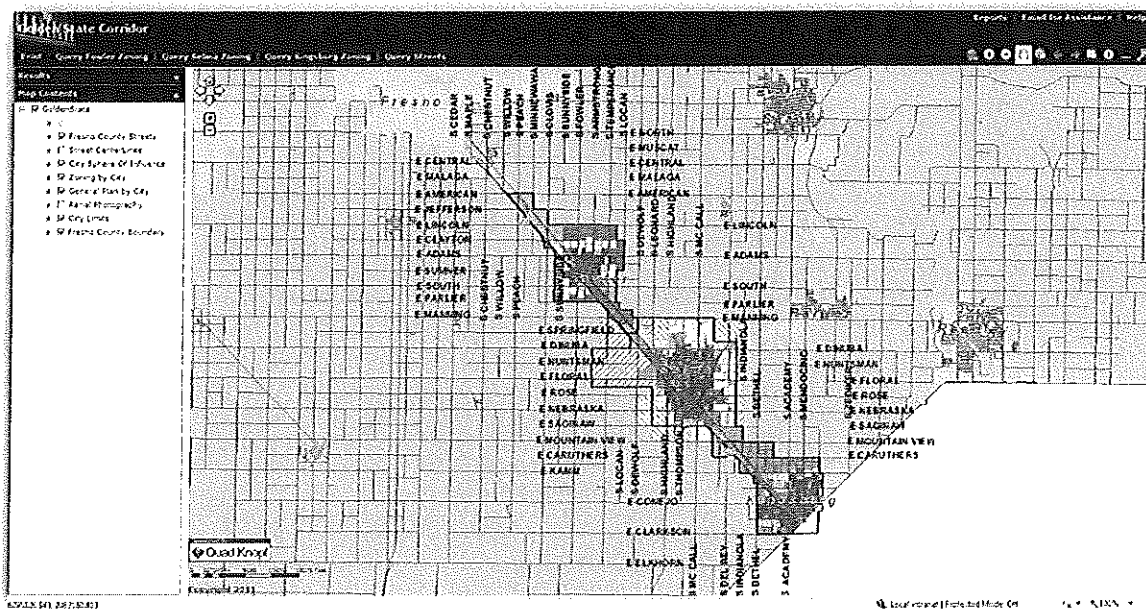


Web Based GIS Application

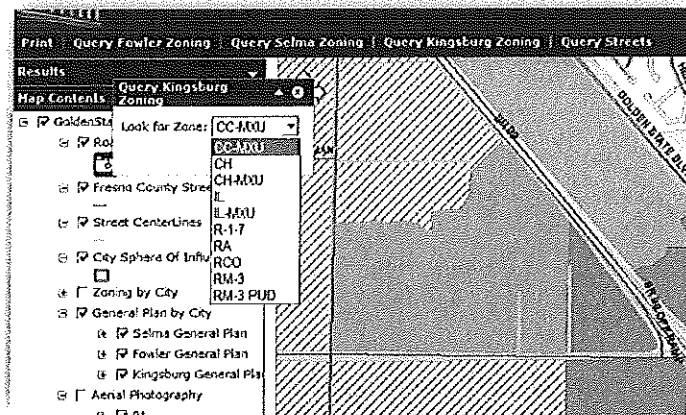
Quad Knopf has developed a Web-based application that is especially suited for our City clients. The Web-based GIS is maintained by Quad Knopf, is stored on secure computer servers, and can be accessed by authorized City staff with a standard internet connection using a username and password.

The Web-based GIS is easy to use and understand. Data that is currently on a number of different paper maps or tables is now all in one location.

The website also includes a digital user's manual that includes examples and scenarios for using the analysis tools of the GIS.



Using this tool can provide several features that are important to the maintenance and operation of the City's facilities. Searches can be set up to locate specific parcels, addresses or streets. Any of the data in the GIS can be queried and zoomed to for research or maintenance needs. Once you locate the area that you need, a print of the map can be obtained for use in reports or general documentation. Special tools can also be used such as measurements, magnification and zoom in or out. As needs arise custom tools can be added for specific requests.

Scope – Construction Phase and Maintenance Phase

Phase 1: Construction Phase – GIS development would consist of incorporating existing information and newly created data into a single system. This data will be maintained in a geo-database form that will reside on Quad Knopf servers and will be available as the City GIS needs are determined. The tasks for the construction phase are described herein:

1. **Data Collection and Refinement - office:** When a GIS is initially set up for a specific area, all data that will be utilized is gathered together in whatever form it is found. Its original form may have a digital format while others are in PDF, CAD, paper maps, spreadsheets, etc. The current workflow of keeping this data up to date is also documented so that it can be modified and continued in the most efficient way possible after the data is converted to a GIS format. All data needs to maintain a connection to the original creator of that data, whether it is the State, County, or City, internal or external source.
2. **Data Collection and Refinement - field:** Some infrastructure data will need to be collected in the field. This will be done using handheld GPS equipment with sub-meter accuracy. The GPS data will then be converted to GIS format and compared with other sources, such as paper maps.
3. **Web-based System Construction:** The shapefiles will be incorporated into a geodatabase and attribute data will be refined to meet the City's needs.
4. **Internal Testing:** Quad Knopf will conduct internal testing for site reliability and data accuracy.
5. **Upload GIS to Quad Knopf off-site server:** Once the system is constructed, a beta version will be uploaded to Quad Knopf's off-site server as a web application.
6. **External Testing with District employees:** We will ask that someone with knowledge of the data do some testing of the beta site. We will sit down with those persons and walk them through the system, and together look for any revisions that might need to be made. Then, once you have people familiar with the system, we will ask what type of web-based user tools would be helpful.
7. **Final Revisions:** We will make final revisions discovered during the external testing.
8. **Web-based User Tools:** Tools will be developed to use in the system based upon your needs identified during the external testing. Examples of tools would be: search functions by address and/or parcel number, the ability to create mailing lists and labels, and the ability to locate parcels within a certain radius of a specific point or parcel.
9. **Training Session:** Quad Knopf will conduct a hands-on training session for your staff at your office. We will walk you through each of the tools in the web-based system and give you some example questions that can be answered with the system. We want to make sure that everyone using the system is comfortable with the data as well as their part in interpreting it.

Phase 2: Maintenance Phase - As changes occur over time, data updates can be made based on new information provided by the City. These data updates, along with the cost of hosting the data on the off-site server would be covered in a nominal yearly fee. The updates would be completed only as requested, usually every six months or at the discretion of the City. The tasks for the Maintenance Phase are described herein:

1. **Data updates (only as requested):** Once the data is in the system, we will work with you to develop procedures to input updates as they occur over time. Training can be put into place for those that will be using the data and another for those that will be updating the data. Skill levels need to be considered to make sure that everyone is comfortable with the data as well as their part in interpreting it.
2. **On-going Server Hosting Fee for Web-based GIS:** This is a yearly fee to cover the cost of renting and maintaining the off-site server. It will be billed bi-annually with the first fee starting once the final revisions have been made to the system.

I. RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council authorize the City Manager to sign a Task Order with City Engineer, Quad-Knopf, under their contract for services for up to \$44,800 (\$37,800 start-up costs, \$3,000 for annual server hosting, and up to \$4,000 for future updates to the GIS) to bring the City's utility maps up to date and into the 21st century.

II. BACKGROUND:

The City's utility maps indicating locations of water, sewer, natural gas, City-owned street lights and storm water systems have not been updated in many years. The mapping with the proposed GIS program will reduce the potential liability and increase the safety of the City's underground utilities. Both staff and contractors working on or near the City's infrastructure and who call for an Underground Service Alert before digging near a City facility will have much better and more accurate information.

III. DISCUSSION:

Our City Engineer, Quad-Knopf, offers a service to their clients that provide a web-based GIS application. Their proposal will collect information from several sources including the County, LAFCo and the City. Once the data is all collected, staff will be provided an opportunity to discuss and edit so that the information is accurate. In the future, staff has discussed with Quad-Knopf the ability to create a more precise GIS using higher resolution photography and to use global positioning (GPS) to locate water and natural gas meters with precision as well as manholes, valves and fire hydrants. This action starts the process and is long overdue.

IV. ALTERNATIVES:

The City does not have the in-house capacity to develop or maintain a GIS for this use.

V. FISCAL IMPACT:

The cost for this program would come entirely from the utility Enterprise Funds. A proportional share would come from the water, sewer and natural gas funds. There are no General Fund costs associated with this program at this time.

It is recommended that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 3611 to submit the Local Transportation Purposes Certifications and Claim Forms to Fresno County to facilitate the collection of its share of the Local Transportation Purposes monies (2006 Measure "C" Extension plan) for fiscal year 2013-14.

II. BACKGROUND:

In May 2013 the Fresno County Transportation Authority Board adopted the Local Transportation Purpose Funds Apportionment for fiscal year 2013-14 on the 2006 Measure "C" Extension Expenditure Plan. Attached is the Fresno County Transportation Authority Board Resolution No. 2013-02 which was passed by the board on May 29, 2013. The following is the Local Transportation Program Pass-Through and Subprograms of which the City of Coalinga will receive Measure C funding:

- 1.87% of \$9,697,568 for Street Maintenance Category sub program, or \$181,041.
- 1.88% of \$336,498 for ADA Compliance Category sub program, or \$6,336.
- 2.21% of \$9,804,344 for Flexible Funding Category sub program, or \$216,619.

Each subprogram has various requirements and exemptions for spending the funds and is outlined in the Measure C Extension 2007 Local Agency Handbook. These are the estimated apportionments scheduled for the FY 2013-14 for the City of Coalinga Measure C Extension Program.

To receive these funds on a monthly basis, the City must file a separate 2013-2014 Certification and Claim form for each sub program along with a City Council Resolution which is to be submitted to the Fresno County Transportation Authority. Once these documents have been accepted, each agency will receive a separate check for each sub program. Measure "C" funds will be distributed on a proportional basis as funds are received.

III. DISCUSSION:

Staff is requesting that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 3611 in order to submit the Local Transportation Program Certifications and Claim forms to the Fresno County Transportation Authority and

authorize the signing of the claim forms by the City Manager in order for the City to begin receiving its share of Measure “C” funds totaling \$403,996.

IV. ALTERNATIVES:

If this action is not taken, then the Measure "C" funding available to the City will be re-distributed to the other cities in Fresno County.

V. FISCAL IMPACT:

The 2013-14 Measure "C" funding will augment other local transportation fund sources to carry out street maintenance programs and public improvements during the fiscal year. There are no General Fund resources used to augment the Measure "C" program funding.

ORDINANCE NO. 774

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COALINGA AMENDING ARTICLE 10 OF CHAPTER 2 OF TITLE 9 OF THE COALINGA MUNICIPAL CODE

The City Council of the City of Coalinga does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Article 10 of Chapter 2 of Title 9 of the Coalinga Municipal Code is hereby revised to read as follows:

“Article 10. NonConforming Uses and Structures

Sec. 9-2.1001 Purpose.

(a) The specific purpose of this section is to permit continuation of uses and continued occupancy and maintenance of structures that were legally established but do not comply with all of the standards and requirements of this Ordinance in a manner that does not impair public health, safety, and general welfare.

Sec. 9-2.1002 Applicability.

(a) These provisions apply to structures, land and uses that have become nonconforming by operation of this Ordinance and that remain in a nonconforming status by application of this chapter, as well as structures, land, and uses that hereafter become nonconforming due to annexation to the City or amendments to the zoning map or development Ordinance text.

Sec. 9-2.1003 Establishment of Legal Nonconforming Uses and Structures.

(a) **Nonconformity.** A non-conformity may result from any inconsistency with the requirements of this Ordinance, including but not limited to location, density, height, yard, usable open space, buffering, or performance standards or the lack of a Conditional Use Permit, variance, or other required authorization. A use or structure shall not be deemed nonconforming solely because it does not conform with the parking dimension standards, loading, planting area, or screening regulations of the district in which it is located or does not conform to the standards for the following building features: garage door location; garage door width; chimney height; cornices, eaves, and other ornamental features that exceed maximum projections into required yards; or bay windows and balconies above the first floor that exceed maximum projections into required yards.

(b) **Nonconforming Uses and Structures—Right to Continue.** Any use or structure that was legally established prior to the effective date of this Ordinance or of any subsequent rezoning or amendment shall be deemed to be in compliance with this Ordinance and may be continued and maintained indefinitely if it has remained in continuous existence. The right to continue a nonconforming use or structure shall run with the land. However, no substitution,

expansion, or other change in use and no alteration or other change in structures is permitted, except as otherwise provided in this section.

Sec. 9-2.1004 Continuation and Maintenance of Nonconforming Structures.

(a) Legal nonconforming structures may be continued and maintained in compliance with the requirements of this chapter unless deemed to be a public nuisance because of health or safety conditions.

(1) **Maintenance and Nonstructural Repairs.** Maintenance, non-structural repairs and non- structural interior alterations are permitted to a nonconforming structure or to a structure occupied by a nonconforming use, so long as the changes and improvements do not enlarge or extend the structure.

(2) **Structural Repairs.** Structural repairs that do not enlarge or extend the structure, including modification or repair of bearing walls, columns, beams or girders, may be undertaken only when the Building Official determines that such modification or repair is immediately necessary to protect public health and safety, occupants of the nonconforming structure, or occupants of adjacent property and when the cost of such work does not exceed fifty (50) percent of the higher of the assessed value of the nonconforming structure as determined by the Fresno County Assessor or an appraisal performed by a certified appraiser for the applicant. If an applicant chooses not to submit an appraisal, the Fresno County Assessor's determination shall be used.

Sec. 9-2.1005 Alterations and Enlargements to Nonconforming Structures.

(a) Nonconforming structures may be enlarged, extended, structurally altered or repaired as long as the use of the property is conforming, and subject to the following provisions.

(1) **Nonconforming Single-Family Dwellings.** A Single-Family Dwelling that is nonconforming with respect to one (1) or more required setbacks may be enlarged or altered, subject to the following standards:

(i) *Interior Side and Rear Setbacks.* Additions or enlargements that maintain a nonconforming interior side or rear yard setback are permitted as long as the addition does not:

1. Further reduce any nonconforming side or rear setback;
2. Create any new encroachment into any other required setback;
3. Increase the existing height of the portion of the structure that is within the required setback;
4. Result in a violation of applicable standards for building coverage, parking, or useable open space; or
5. Result in a violation of any standard of the Building Code.

(ii) *Front Setbacks.* Additions or enlargements that vertically or horizontally extend a nonconforming front yard setback may be approved based on a finding that the proposed addition will maintain the average setback of development on the same block front within two hundred (200) feet of the lot.

(iii) *Height.* Additions or enlargements that horizontally extend a nonconforming side or rear setback of any portion of a structure that is nonconforming with respect to height may be approved based on findings that the proposed alteration will not:

1. Substantially interfere with solar access available to surrounding properties;
2. Reduce the privacy of surrounding properties; or
3. Create a structure that is incompatible with the character of surrounding development due to its bulk or form.

(2) **Nonconforming Parking.**

(i) *Nonresidential Structures.* A nonresidential structure that is nonconforming because it does not satisfy the parking requirements of this Ordinance may not be expanded unless the parking spaces that are required for the expansion are provided in accordance with applicable provisions of Chapter 4, Off-Street Parking and Loading.

(ii) *Residential Structures.* A residential structure that is nonconforming because two (2) spaces have not been previously required by this Ordinance may be altered or expanded with only one (1) covered space, provided that such alterations or expansions of an individual dwelling shall not cumulatively exceed twenty-five (25) percent of the habitable floor area at the time of the first expansion or alteration.

(iii) *Exception.* No residence may be constructed or expanded by more than one thousand (1,000) square feet of additional habitable area without providing parking in accordance with the applicable provisions of Chapter 4, Off-Street Parking and Loading.

(3) **Nonconforming Lot Coverage.** A structure that is nonconforming because it exceeds the maximum allowable lot coverage may be expanded in floor area only if the expansion does not increase the lot coverage.

Sec. 9-2.1006 Changes and Substitutions of Nonconforming Uses.

(a) No legal nonconforming use shall be substantially expanded or changed in operation without the approval of a Conditional Use Permit as provided for in this chapter. This requirement shall not apply to a change of ownership, tenancy, or management where the new use is in the same classification as the previous use, as defined within each Zoning District in Chapter 2, and the use is not expanded.

(1) **Change from Nonconforming to Permitted Use.** Any nonconforming use may be changed to a use that is allowed by right in the zoning district in which it is located and complies with all applicable standards for such use.

(2) **Conditional Use Permit to Legalize Use.** Any use that is nonconforming solely by reason of the absence of a Conditional Use Permit may be changed to a conforming use by obtaining the required permit.

(3) **Change from Nonconforming Use to Other Nonconforming Use.** The City Council may allow the expansion of a Class I use, substitution of a Class II nonconforming use with a Class I nonconforming use, or substitution of a Class I nonconforming use with another Class I nonconforming use, subject to approval of a Conditional Use Permit and the requirements of this chapter.

- (i) *Class I.* Class I nonconforming uses are designated by the City Council following a public hearing and based on findings that:
1. The existing nonconforming use was legally established;
 2. The proposed expansion or substitution of the nonconforming use would not be detrimental to public health, safety, or welfare;
 3. The proposed expansion or substitution would not be inconsistent with the General Plan and would not preclude or interfere with implementation of any applicable adopted City plan;
 4. The proposed use will not depress the value of nearby properties; and
 5. No useful purpose would be served by strict application of the provisions or requirements of this Ordinance with which the use or structure does not conform.
- (ii) *Class II.* Class II nonconforming uses include any legally established nonresidential use that involves the following:
1. Storage, use, or generation of hazardous materials, processes, products, or wastes;
 2. Activity that maybe detrimental to public health and safety because of the potential to create dust, glare, heat, noise, noxious gases, odor, smoke, vibration;
 3. Conditions that would be incompatible with surrounding uses; or
 4. Any nonconforming Adult Oriented Business.

Sec. 9-2.1007 Changes and Substitutions of Nonconforming Uses.

(a) No legal nonconforming use shall be substantially expanded or changed in operation without the approval of a Conditional Use Permit as provided for in this chapter. This requirement shall not apply to a change of ownership, tenancy, or management where the new use is in the same classification as the previous use, as defined within each Zoning District in Chapter 2, and the use is not expanded.

(1) **Change from Nonconforming to Permitted Use.** Any nonconforming use may be changed to a use that is allowed by right in the zoning district in which it is located and complies with all applicable standards for such use.

(2) **Conditional Use Permit to Legalize Use.** Any use that is nonconforming solely by reason of the absence of a Conditional Use Permit may be changed to a conforming use by obtaining the required permit.

(i) *Within a Structure That Conforms to the Zoning Ordinance.* A Class I nonconforming use in a structure that conforms to this Ordinance and to the requirements of the Building Code may expand the floor area that it occupies, subject to Conditional Use Permit approval provided that no structural alteration is proposed or made for the purpose of the expansion.

1. A nonconforming use may not be expanded to occupy all or a part of another structure or another lot that it did not occupy on the effective date of this Ordinance.

2. The expansion of the nonconforming use shall not exceed fifty (50) percent of the area that the nonconforming use legally occupies at the time of application.

(ii) *Within a Structure That Does Not Conform to the Zoning Ordinance.* A Class I nonconforming use in a structure that does not conform to the requirements of this Ordinance may expand its occupancy and building floor area subject to the requirements above.

(iii) *Within a Structure That Does Not Conform to the Building Code.* Any nonconforming use in a structure that does not conform to the Building Code may not expand the area it occupies. A Class I nonconforming use may expand the area it occupies subject to Conditional Use Permit approval after the structure is brought into conformance with all applicable Building Code requirements.

(iv) *City Council Review.* The City Council shall hold a public hearing, pursuant to the procedures established in Chapter 6, Article 1, Common Procedures, on each application for a change or substitution of use. In addition to any other findings that may be required, the City Council shall find that:

1. The proposed new use will be more compatible with the purposes of the district and surrounding uses than the nonconforming use it replaces;
2. The proposed new use will not be detrimental to the health, safety, peace, comfort or general welfare of persons residing or working in the surrounding area or be detrimental or injurious to property and improvements of adjacent properties, the surrounding area, or the neighborhood because of noise, traffic generation, odors, dust, glare, vibrations, or other effects; and
3. The proposed new use will comply with all applicable standards or there are special circumstances peculiar to the property and its relation to surrounding uses or to the district itself that would justify modification to applicable standards.

(v) *Standards for Council Determination.* In making its findings and conclusions pursuant to above, the City Council shall consider the following factors:

1. Noise;
2. Traffic generation;
3. Hours of operation;
4. Noxious or annoying emissions of odor, smoke, waste water or other matters;
5. Proximity of the use to conforming uses;
6. Extent and severity of nonconformity;
7. Effect of the nonconforming use on surrounding conforming uses;
8. Character of the surrounding neighborhood, including the number and proportion of nonconforming uses;
9. Access to the nonconforming use;
10. Maintenance of the nonconforming use; and
11. Any other factors the City Council deems relevant given the purposes of this chapter.

(vi) *Conditions.* When making its decision on an application for a change or substitution of use, the Council may establish conditions that are necessary to accomplish the purposes of this chapter, including, but not limited to:

1. Required improvement of, or modifications to existing improvements on, the property;
2. Limitations on hours of operations;
3. Limitations on the nature of operations; and
4. A specified term of years for which the continued nonconforming use shall be allowed.

(vii) *Revocation of Approved Changes of Nonconforming Use.* The City Council may initiate a review of a changed or substituted nonconforming uses upon its own motion, or following a recommendation from the Community Development Director, in accordance with Chapter 6, Article 1, Common Procedures, and the following standards and procedures.

1. *Initiation of Revocation Procedure.* Initiation of City Council review of a nonconforming use approved pursuant to this section shall first require a report from the Community Development Director based upon the Community Development Directors' independent investigation and determination, recommending action by the Council.

2. *City Council Review and Decision.* The City Council shall hold a public hearing, pursuant to the procedures established in Chapter 6, Article 1. Upon the conclusion of the public hearing, the Council shall determine whether the nonconforming status shall be revoked and the use discontinued or allowed to continue subject to conditions. In making its determination the Council shall base its decision on the same considerations it used when approving the Conditional Use Permit to allow a change or substitution of a nonconforming use and the standards above.

Sec. 9-2.1008 Restoration of Damaged Nonconforming Structures.

(a) **Restoration When Damage is Less than Seventy-Five (75) Percent of Value.**

- (1) If a nonconforming structure or a structure containing a nonconforming use is destroyed by fire or other calamity, to the extent of seventy-five (75) percent or less of the replacement cost, as determined by the Building Official, the structure may be restored and the nonconforming use may be resumed, provided that a building permit for restoration is issued within six (6) months and restoration work is diligently pursued to completion.

(b) **Restoration When Damage Exceeds Seventy-Five (75) Percent of Value.**

- (1) If any nonconforming structure or a structure containing a nonconforming use is destroyed by fire, explosion or other casualty or involuntary destruction to an extent of seventy-five (75) percent or greater of the replacement cost, as determined by the Building Official, then the structure may be restored and used only in compliance with the applicable regulations for the district where it is located, except as provided below.

- (i) *Exceptions for Residential Structures.* Any nonconforming residential use maybe reconstructed, restored, or rebuilt up to the size and number of dwelling units prior to the damage and the nonconforming use, if any, may be resumed unless the City finds that:

1. The reconstruction, restoration, or rebuilding will be detrimental or injurious to the health, safety, or general welfare of persons residing or working in the neighborhood, or will be detrimental or injurious to property and improvements in the neighborhood.

2. The existing nonconforming use of the building or structure can be more appropriately moved to a zoning district in which the use is permitted, or that there no longer exists a district in which the existing nonconforming use is permitted.

3. Any reconstruction, restoration, or rebuilding undertaken pursuant to this section shall conform to all applicable Building Code requirements.

4. A building permit shall be obtained within two (2) years after the date of the damage or destruction.

Sec. 9-2.1009 Correction of Nonconforming Site Features.

(a) Prior to occupancy of a site or structure that is nonconforming due to lack of one (1) of the following: screening of mechanical equipment; required walls or fences to screen parking; required paving for driveways; or required landscaping; a schedule for elimination or substantial reduction of these nonconformities over a period not exceeding five (5) years shall be submitted. Priority may be given to elimination of nonconformities that have a significant adverse impact on surrounding properties, and shall not require a commitment to remove nonconformities that have a minor impact and would be costly to eliminate due to the configuration of the site and the location of existing structures.

Se. 9-2.1010 Abandonment of Nonconforming Uses.

(a) No nonconforming use may be resumed, reestablished, reopened or replaced by any other nonconforming use after it has been abandoned or vacated for a period of six (6) months, except as provided for in this section. The nonconforming use of a legally established structure may be reestablished if the City Council approves a Conditional Use Permit after making all the following findings in addition to any other required findings. As a condition of approving the resumption of such nonconforming use, the Council may impose a time limit on its duration if necessary in order to make the required findings.

(1) The structure cannot be used for any conforming use because of its original design or because of legal structural changes made for a previous nonconforming use;

(2) The structure can be reasonably expected to remain in active use for a period of twenty (20) years without requiring repairs or maintenance in excess of fifty (50) percent of the replacement cost of the structure, as defined in this chapter, within any five (5) year period; and

(3) The continuation of the use or structure will not be incompatible with or detrimental to surrounding conforming uses.”

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its adoption.

Section 3. The City Clerk is further directed to cause this ordinance or a summary of this ordinance to be published once in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated within the City of Coalinga, within fifteen (15) days after its adoption. If a summary of the ordinance is published, then the City Clerk shall cause a certified copy of the full text of the proposed ordinance to be posted in the office of the City Clerk at least five days prior to the Council meeting at which the ordinance is adopted and again after the meeting at which the ordinance is adopted. The summary shall be approved by the City Attorney.

I. RECOMMENDATION:

Introduce and waive the first reading of Ordinance No. 774 as it relates to non-conforming uses and structures.

II. BACKGROUND:

The City of Coalinga is in the process of drafting a new zoning code and one of the major changes that will occur is the language related to nonconforming uses and structures and how they are regulated. This section will have an immediate impact on the Citizens of Coalinga as it will allow for the continued use of existing nonconforming uses and structures contrary to the current code that is outdated and utilized an amortization period for the complete elimination of uses and structures that do not conform to the zoning code. Therefore, staff is requesting that the Council consider approving Ordinance No. 774 and replace the existing nonconforming use section with the new language which was recommended by the Planning Commission at their June 11, 2013 regularly scheduled meeting.

III. DISCUSSION:

The specific purpose of the nonconforming use and structures section is to permit continuation of uses and continued occupancy and maintenance of structures that were legally established but do not comply with all of the standards and requirements of the zoning code in a manner that does not impair public health, safety, and general welfare.

These provisions apply to structures, land and uses that have become nonconforming by operation of this Ordinance and that remain in a nonconforming status by application of this chapter, as well as structures, land, and uses that hereafter become nonconforming due to annexation to the City or amendments to the zoning map or development ordinance text.

The City recognizes that in an application for a loan, an appraiser may raise the issue that the existing residential use is a non-conforming use due to the current zoning of the parcel as commercial. The Coalinga Municipal Code/Zoning Ordinance defines a non-conforming use "a use which was lawfully established and maintained prior to the adoption of the current Zoning Ordinance, but which under the current Zoning Ordinance does not conform with the use regulations of the district in which it is located (Coalinga Municipal Code Section 9.2-1000)." In the case of our existing code there is an amortization period, for example 20 years in the case of residential, where the nonconforming use would need to come to an end.

Staff is under the impression that the City Council is not amenable to enforcing such drastic measures to a nonconforming use when it does not impair the public health, safety, and general welfare. The language presented in Ordinance No. 774 regulates these uses in a manner that does not impair public health, safety, and general welfare while allowing them to remain. This would allow someone who owns a home to restore

their home should it be damaged by fire or other calamity. However, the current code would preclude such restoration from occurring.

Therefore, staff feels that this is an action that is needed sooner rather than later based on its impact to current sales, purchases, refinances, and possible rebuilds of structures that are preexisting nonconforming. This is a section of that zoning code update that would eventually be presented to the Council.

IV. ALTERNATIVES:

Do not waive the first reading of Ordinance No. 774 - Staff does not recomend.

V. FISCAL IMPACT:

No known fiscal impact at this time identified.

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**STATE HOUSING ELEMENT LAW****Overview**

State law requires each city and county to adopt a general plan containing at least seven mandatory elements including housing. Unlike the other general plan elements, the housing element, required to be updated every five to six years, is subject to detailed statutory requirements and mandatory review by a State agency, the California Department of Housing and Community Development (Department). Housing elements have been mandatory portions of local general plans since 1969. This reflects the statutory recognition that housing is a matter of statewide importance and cooperation between government and the private sector is critical to attainment of the State's housing goals. The availability of an adequate supply of housing affordable to workers, families, and seniors is critical to the State's long-term economic competitiveness and the quality of life for all Californians.

Housing element law requires local governments to adequately plan to meet their existing and projected housing needs including their share of the regional housing need. Housing element law is the State's primary market-based strategy to increase housing supply, affordability and choice. The law recognizes that in order for the private sector to adequately address housing needs and demand, local governments must adopt land-use plans and regulatory schemes that provide opportunities for, and do not unduly constrain, housing development.

The housing element process begins with the Department allocating a region's share of the statewide housing need to the appropriate Councils of Governments (COG) based on Department of Finance population projections and regional population forecasts used in preparing regional transportation plans. The COG develops a Regional Housing Need Plan (RHNP) allocating the region's share of the statewide need to the cities and counties within the region. The RHNP is required to promote the following objectives to:

- (1) Increase the housing supply and the mix of housing types, tenure, and affordability in all cities and counties within the region in an equitable manner;
- (2) Promote infill development and socioeconomic equity, the protection of environmental and agricultural resources, and the encouragement of efficient development patterns; and
- (3) Promote an improved intraregional relationship between jobs and housing.

Housing element law recognizes the most critical decisions regarding housing development occur at the local level within the context of the periodically updated general plan. The housing element component of the general plan requires local governments to

balance the need for growth, including the need for additional housing, against other competing local interests. Housing element law promotes the State's interest in encouraging open markets and providing opportunities for the private sector to address the State's housing demand, while leaving the ultimate decision about how and where to plan for growth at the regional and local levels. While land-use planning is fundamentally a local issue, the availability of housing is a matter of statewide importance. Housing element law and the RHNP process requires local governments to be accountable for ensuring that projected housing needs can be accommodated. The process maintains local control over where and what type of development should occur in local communities while providing the opportunity for the private sector to meet market demand.

In general, a housing element must at least include the following components:

A Housing Needs Assessment:

- Existing Needs - The number of households overpaying for housing, living in overcrowded conditions, or with special housing needs (e.g., the elderly, large families, homeless), the number of housing units in need of repair, and assisted affordable units at-risk of converting to market-rate.
- Projected Needs - The city or county's share of the regional housing need as established in the RHNP prepared by the COG. The allocation establishes the number of new units needed, by income category, to accommodate expected population growth over the planning period of the housing element. The RHNP provides a benchmark for evaluating the adequacy of local zoning and regulatory actions to ensure each local government is providing sufficient appropriately designated land and opportunities for housing development to address population growth and job generation.

A Sites Inventory and Analysis:

The element must include a detailed land inventory and analysis including a site specific inventory listing properties, zoning and general plan designation, size and existing uses; a general analysis of environmental constraints and the availability of infrastructure, and evaluation of the suitability, availability and realistic development capacity of sites to accommodate the jurisdiction's share of the regional housing need by income level. If the analysis does not demonstrate adequate sites, appropriately zoned to meet the jurisdictions share of the regional housing need, by income level, the element must include a program to provide the needed sites including providing zoning that allows owner-occupied and rental multifamily uses "by-right" with minimum densities and development standards that allow at least 16 units per site for sites.



An Analysis of Constraints on Housing:

- Governmental - Includes land-use controls, fees and exactions, on- and off-site improvement requirements, building codes and their enforcement, permit and processing procedures, and potential constraints on the development or improvement of housing for persons with disabilities.



Housing Programs

Programs are required to identify adequate sites to accommodate the locality's share of the regional housing need; assist in the development of housing for extremely low, lower- and moderate-income households; remove or mitigate governmental constraints; conserve and improve the existing affordable housing stock; promote equal housing opportunity; and preserve the at-risk units identified.

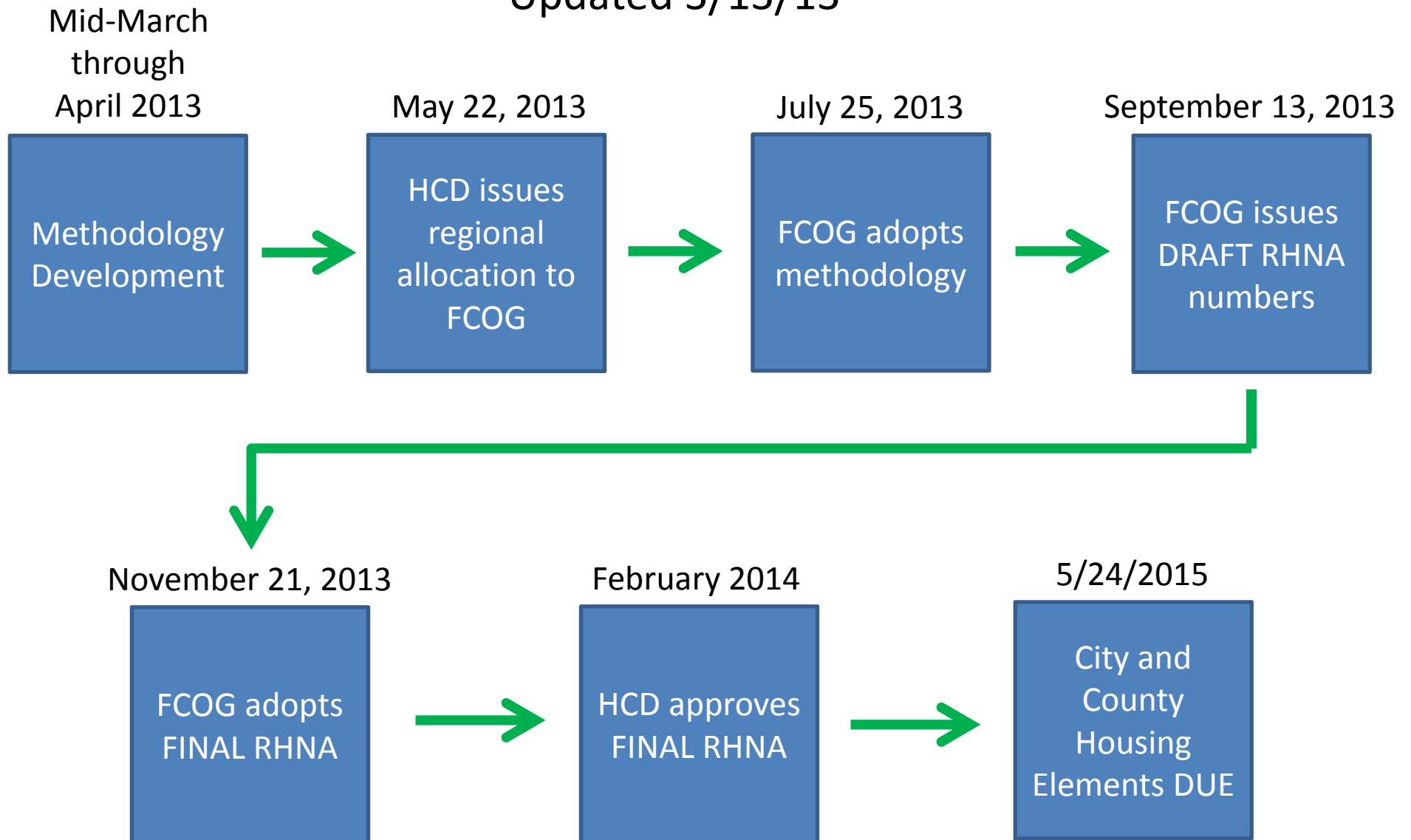

I. RECOMMENDATION:

Staff is seeking direction from the Council to pursue the approach of a Countywide Housing Element for Planning Period 2015-2023.

II. BACKGROUND:

The City of Coalinga adopted its 2006-2013 Planning Period Housing Element in March of 2010. Unfortunately, due to the late adoption of the 2006-2013 Housing Element Policy document, the next planning period for the state mandated housing element will be from 5/24/2015 – 5/24/2023. Previously, the planning periods for the Housing Elements were (7) seven years and now they will be (8) years to be synchronized and aligned with the Regional Transportation Plan/ Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS). Housing Elements that are more than 120 days late will revert to a 4 year planning period and it will take 2 full planning cycles to revert back to the 8 year cycle so there is huge incentive to adopt and certify a housing element on time.

The Fresno Council of Governments has been assigned the responsibility to act as the liaison between the 15 cities and Fresno County and the State Department of Housing and Community Development to administer the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA). Once the State has determined the number of housing units required within the County for all levels of affordability, it is up to the cities and the county to adopt and implement a methodology for distributing that responsibility among the jurisdictions. The Housing Element document is that policy document that ensures the ability to accommodate that assigned number of units within each given jurisdiction through zone changes, policies, programs, and incentives.

The RHNA technical committee, comprised of local planning staff from all 15 cities and Fresno County, have been discussing the idea of a countywide housing element as a way to reduce costs and redundancy that would occur at a local level. In addition, all the of the cities as the table have mentioned that they will be contracting out the service as staffing levels are depleted and expertise in this field is limited which would ultimately increase costs. Therefore, staff is seeking direction and support from the City Council to further investigate and pursue this option as way to fulfill the state mandated requirement.

III. DISCUSSION:

A County-Wide Housing Element is one housing element document with chapters and appendices that would fulfill the housing element needs of each of the 15 cities within Fresno County and the County of Fresno.

Two counties within the State of California (Kings and Marin) currently use this regional approach and have adopted County-Wide Housing Elements.

The Fresno COG 2013 RHNA Technical Committee members have expressed an interest in a County-Wide

Housing Element for Fresno County and its 15 cities. On May 16, 2013 Greg Gatzka from Kings County presented the pros and cons of a county-wide housing element and was available for questions from the committee. Kings County and its 5 cities have done a county-wide housing element since the 1980's. In Kings County, the Kings County Association of Governments (KCAG) administers the consultant process and serves as the coordinator between all of its member agencies for the housing element process.

A county-wide housing element in Fresno County would mean anticipated cost savings for all of the cities and the county. All of Fresno COG's member agencies are currently planning to contract out their next housing element as opposed to completing the work in house. A shared housing element would also reduce any duplication of work on this element of the general plans.

Fresno COG management has said that if it is decided that this is something its member agencies would like to pursue Fresno COG would be willing to act as the coordinator. It is an idea that needs to come from COG's member agencies though, as that is really how the discussion started.

At the June Policy Advisory Committee (PAC) meeting COG staff introduced the county-wide housing element concept and will be seeking guidance as to whether or not we should move forward with more research on the process and cost savings possibilities.

If the City fails to certify its housing element and re-zone the sites identified in the "Voluntary Rezone" component of the Housing Element, the State Department of Housing and Community Development could take action to de-certify the existing Housing Element. There are several potential consequences resulting from de-certification, including the risk of litigation and loss of state and federal housing assistance funding (CDBG, HOME, Cal HOME, Etc.). Courts are mandated by statute to impose sanctions if a Housing Element is ruled invalid such as building moratoria.

In addition to building permit moratoria, courts could impose moratoria on local land use authority (thus taking away local control of land use decisions). Lastly, local jurisdictions are usually responsible for paying litigants' attorney fees.

A moratorium would disrupt the provision and delivery of facilities and amenities expected by Coalinga residents. Impact fees are collected upon building permit issuance to pay for parks, road improvements, and other facilities. With a moratorium, no permits may be issued; thus, no fees are collected and construction of these amenities would be delayed for an indeterminate period of time. While a building moratorium is a worst case scenario, it is not outside the realm of possibility, as similar situations have occurred throughout the region and state.

Therefore, in order to avoid these penalties and possible moratoria, staff is trying to find the most economical approach to complete the next housing element.

IV. ALTERNATIVES:

Direct staff not to pursue the County-wide Housing Element approach - Staff does not recommend.

V. FISCAL IMPACT:

At this time staff is unable to verify the cost to complete the Housing Element under the Countywide approach until such an approach is supported by the Council, therefore allowing the RHNA technical committee to request cost proposals to qualified consultants. The Committee did not want to waste the time of consultants if the approach was not supported in concept.

However, city staff has received some preliminary numbers to complete its own Housing Element through a

consultant under the streamline provisions for approximately \$40,000.

I. RECOMMENDATION:

Staff is seeking Council direction as to how they would like to use of the remaining \$2,159,828 in Housing Bond proceeds allocated for low to moderate income housing activities.

II. BACKGROUND:

In 2009 the City Council passed an RDA Tax Allocation Bond and as part of that bond was approximately 2.2 Million Dollars in housing proceeds to be used for low to moderate income qualifying housing activities or projects. Since the passage of the bond none of the funds have been expended except for recent debt payments and costs associated with ongoing loan activity. At the Council's last meeting a request was made from the Warthan Place Apartments Investors for a share of those funds in order to leverage phase one of their workforce housing multi-family project.

At that meeting the Council gave direction to staff to table the consideration until the Council has had time to discuss other opportunities for the use of funds before making a determination in contributing to the Warthan Place Apartments project.

III. DISCUSSION:

Staff is bringing this item to the Council for discussion and possible direction for the use of some or all of these remaining funds that have been allocated for low to moderate income housing. Here are some subjects that have been discussed by Council in past meetings as well as requests by others:

West Hills College Build-A-House Program

There have been discussions in the past related to a partnership with West Hills Community College (WHC) for a build-a-house program. WHC has submitted a grant to support the administration of the program and the City has agreed it would assist the program through providing costs for materials. Staff estimates, should WHC receive the grant funding for program development and support, the initial seed money per home for materials would be approximately \$100,000. In order to sustain this program the houses built would have to be sold to income qualifying buyers and the proceeds from each sale placed in a revolving fund for the next build.

Warthan Place Apartments Request

The Warthan Place Apartments Investors have requested \$1.7 million dollars from the City's Housing Bond Proceeds to assist them in phase 1 of their workforce housing project on Warthan Street and Sacramento Street. Utilizing these funds to assist this type of project is appropriate and very common as workforce housing cannot be funded without the assistance of the local jurisdictions. Historically throughout the state, affordable housing projects receive approximately 32% of the project costs through local assistance. This use of the Housing Bond Proceeds would provide the City the "best bang for its buck" related to providing affordable/workforce housing, assisting in meeting our Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) and creating new residential units within the City at an affordable level.

Housing Rehabilitation and Down payment Assistance Programs (Previously Administered by the RDA)

The RDA previously administered the down payment assistance program as well as the housing rehab program which were both successful programs but were suspended due to the dissolution of the RDA and no other fund is available to administer such housing programs. Although these funds can be used to restore these programs, the City has applied for HOME and CDBG for a total of approximately \$1.5 million dollars which would support those two programs for quit sometime. Staff is very confident that based on last years scores the City of Coalinga has a very competitive application and high probability of being awarded funds.

IV. ALTERNATIVES:

The Council can provide staff other avenues to entertain with the housing proceeds.

V. FISCAL IMPACT:

The City has approximately \$2.2 Million Dollars of low to moderate income funding availability at their discretion.

I. RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council authorize the City Manager to purchase 197 acre-feet (AF) of additional water supply from the San Luis Delta Mendota Water Authority (SLDMWA) for Water Year 2014 (WY14) at a unit cost of \$265.47 per AF or a total of \$52,297.59.

II. BACKGROUND:

Council is aware the City's water supply from the USBR has been reduced to 70% of historical average, or 4,561 AF for WY14, which runs from March 2013 through February 2014. This volume leaves the City about 150 AF short of its average water supply demands from the past couple of years. In May the USBR brought the cities of Coalinga, Avenal, Huron, and Fresno together to discuss the potential availability of an additional supply of water from the City of Fresno. The City of Fresno was able to pull together 2,000 AF, of which Coalinga requested 500 AF, and Avenal and Huron 750 AF each. Recall that both Avenal and Huron have much smaller USBR water supply contracts and have a much more acute need for water. Fresno made a proposal to the three cities and their proposal is still stands. In mid-June, the USBR contacted the three cities to indicate they were actively seeking other water supplies alternatives that were less costly than the proposal from the City of Fresno.

For some context on the current water market in California – the USBR shared with the cities last week that there are negotiations for water transfers approaching \$1,000 per AF in California.

The Oakdale Irrigation District and South San Joaquin Irrigation District (Districts) contacted the USBR and SLDMWA and let them know they were in a position to make available and transfer up to 36,000 AF of water at a unit cost of \$112.15 per AF plus any current USBR costs for contract water. For the City, the price of an additional water supply from the Districts plus our current water contract costs of \$153.32 per AF places the unit cost for this water at \$265.47 per AF. The USBR indicated to the three cities it is their intent, desire to find, and make available other less costly water supplies. The USBR went on to further state it would “play well” and demonstrate to others that there is no special treatment being provided to the three communities by the cities taking a pro-rata portion of the water being offered by Districts. The Districts water is being made available to 25 water customers on the Central Valley Project system on a proportional basis. Coalinga's share based on our contract with USBR when compared with the other agencies is 197 AF. Avenal and Huron's proportional share of the districts water is 69 and 59 AF respectively.

III. DISCUSSION:

Council recalls from its last meeting, the City of Fresno has offered up to 500 AF of water supply to the City to be paid for in one of three ways:

1. \$300 per AF plus conveyance costs;
2. \$100 per AF plus conveyance costs and twice the provided water volume sold to the City of Fresno from the City's USBR contract when sufficient water is allocated in the future; and
3. \$100 per AF, plus conveyance costs, and twice the provided water volume in the form of Recovered Water Credits which are to be negotiated from other water agencies in the Friant Division when flood waters are available.

The first option from Fresno is more costly than this report's recommendation. The second option from Fresno may work for the City, but before the City heads down this path, it would be prudent to wait and see if the USBR can come up with an additional water supply at our current cost for water from them.

IV. ALTERNATIVES:

Staff's recommendation seeks authorization to contract for this 197 AF from the SLDMWA for \$265.47 per AF and hold on a bit longer to see if USBR can come up with an additional 303 AF of water supply, a total of 500 AF, for a cost similar to the City's current water costs, which are slightly less than \$155 per AF.

One alternative would involve option 1 from the City of Fresno. A second alternative would involve option 2 from the City of Fresno. The last alternative would entail not seeking any additional water and face a potential water shortage later on in the calendar year.

V. FISCAL IMPACT:

The cost for the purchase of water supply is a component of the Water Plant's appropriation request out of the Water Enterprise Fund. In the past couple of fiscal years, the appropriation for water has been set at \$800,000 or for approximately 5,200 AF at the current unit cost for water. There is no funding from the General Fund related to this action.
